Church School Corner

Church School is off to a great start for the new year. We began the year by learning about the Feast of the Elevation of the cross in September with a scavenger hunt. We also learned about the sacraments of Baptism, Chrismation and Communion. In October we started putting together our own personal prayer books, this will be an ongoing project throughout the year. In October we started focusing mainly on Sunday's Gospel lesson which you can find on the Antiochian Website (https://antiochian.org/dashboard?name=christian%20education). There are additional resources and activities for parents and caregivers under Christian Education. I have been sending each child home with the coloring sheet that accompanies the Gospel lesson and encouraging them to share the Gospel story we read and the lesson they learned with their family. The other focus of church school has been church etiquette and we have been practicing being quiet and still so we can hear God's voice in church and in everyday life. We learned about the Feast of the Entrance of the Theotokos to the temple on November 21st and then celebrated the feast at Divine Liturgy. We are excited to be preparing for the Nativity Feast and we will spend the month of December learning about the Winter Saints (St Herman, St Lucia and St Nicholas) and of course the Nativity of our Savior the Lord Jesus Christ. I have enjoyed getting to know each of the children in church school and look forward to the rest of the year. We meet every Sunday morning (unless noted otherwise) from Labor Day thru Memorial Day at 9 am in the church hall. The Kjendal Kliros

The fall of 2021 brought a new look to St. Michael: a new chanter stand. To explore what led to this new stand, we met with its builders, Anders Kjendal and Rick Bardine.

Q. How did you come up with the idea of building the chanter stand?

Singing is and always has been an integral part of our Orthodox liturgical practice. During the height of the pandemic, when attendance at services was limited, our chanters, Erika and Anders, and our choir director, Dave, kept this musical traditional alive.



As the church reopened and more people were able to return for services, new chanters came forward to help with liturgy. We found that we needed a better focal point to center our singing and to store and read music for Vespers, Orthros and Divine Liturgy. Our needs coalesced during Great Lent. So, the idea of buying or building a new chanter stand was born.

Q. What inspired you? How did you do your research?

We started by thinking about how and where we sing at St. Michael. In our church, we have dedicated chanters, a choir and broad participation of our congregation in hymns and prayers. The "kliros" is the area dedicated to the choir and refers to both the area where the chanters and choir assemble and the music stand on which music is stored and read. In St. Michael, as in many Orthodox churches, the kliros is to the right side and in front of the iconostasis. So, we knew the area, and then did some Internet research for designs we could use for the stand itself.



We realized that, although we found many examples of chanter stands, we had some unique requirements which would be best served by customizing a stand for our needs. We knew we needed enough storage area for the music binders for the chanters and the choir which had been stored in crates behind the old chanter stand. We also felt that we would need both fixed and moveable shelves to accommodate the Epistle book and other music and books we use throughout the Liturgical Year. Finally, we knew that we would need three or four different areas from which the chanters could read the services and that, ideally, we may want to rotate the top of the stand so that we could display the appropriate text and music during services. And so, armed with those requirements, we sketched the chanter stand which we built.

Q. What were the biggest challenges you faced?


The body of the stand wasn't too difficult to envision or build. Our greatest challenge was figuring out the angles we would need for the top and how to let it freely rotate.

We designed during the latter part of Great Lent, started building shortly after Pascha and installed it for the Dormition of the Theotokos in August. Although it took some time from idea to completion, the stand came together easily through the combined design and building efforts of our chanters, Erika and Anders, a little woodworking effort by Rick and a wonderful Orthodox woodcarver, Subdeacon Dan



Rudder, who carved the cross on the front of the stand, a lot of prayers and the grace of God. We hope that the music from the Kjendal Kliros will bless our church for many years to come.

The Unexpected Gift – by George Sowpel

Clang! Clang! Clang! The shrill clatter of the bell pierced the softly falling snow. Franny sat on the sidewalk in front of the pizza shop on Main Street in Hyannis. It was a gray December afternoon and the noise came from the Salvation Army collection station next door. Franny didn't bother to look at it - technology had replaced the human element. A small optical scanner sensed when someone approached, signalling the bell to ring - rising in volume when a coin was placed in the kettle. Many of the people she knew from the shelter had lost their small source of earnings at Christmas when the automated devices arrived.

As she pulled her tattered coat closer to ward off the chill, Franny heard the sound of approaching footsteps. She raised her gaze hoping to catch the eyes of the person above. At this hour she knew it would likely be someone leaving early from work to perhaps do a bit of gift shopping at the department store nearby, or a student leaving the school next door. In either case she figured the person would be in a good mood.

While a small cup was placed on the ground next to her, money was not the reason Franny sat here each afternoon. Her needs were small - the shelter gave her a sandwich and a fresh bar of soap daily. What money she did manage to collect, she gave away. Usually to the older people who had a harder time managing their problems. Sometimes she bought cat food for the strays that slept behind the church across the street.

What caused Franny to return every day was the hope of connecting with another human being. Twenty years on the streets had taken its toll on her - physically and mentally. She looked older than her forty-two years; wrinkles from worry and the weather cast a harsh look on her features. On days the shelter was full, Franny slept in a small tent or under the bandstand on the Green - often in frigid temperatures or damp, rainy conditions. She was no stranger to physical violence, being teased then beaten by groups of kids more times than she would like to remember. The cadre of "homeless" people in Hyannis helped each other when they could, but for the most part kept to themselves. Franny's life was a lonely one.

Sarah turned the corner as she exited the school on Main Street. As she often did after band practice, she headed to the pizza shop to pick up a sandwich. A quiet girl, Sarah did not have many friends. In fact her life had been quite chaotic as a child - moving from town to town. Her dad's job as a business executive paid very well but required the family to lead a nomadic lifestyle. Just when she made new friends, they had to move. Sarah found comfort in her books and learned to avoid close relationships. She lived in a large home in Osterville, but often it was empty - with her dad at work and mother out with friends or shopping.

Franny looked up as the girl walked by. As Sarah usually did, she placed a ten dollar bill in the woman's cup before opening the door to the restaurant. Her parents had taught her that with their

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wealth came a responsibility to be generous and giving. They also told her about the dangers of being alone after dark, so she always averted her eyes so as to not make contact with the haggard looking woman on the sidewalk.

As the street lights came on, Franny knew it was time to head to the shelter. The doors closed at five o'clock and on cold nights there was a long line to get in. Often a fight would break out and the staff had to regain order. For the most part the counselors were young and kind, but their energy was often focused on the loudest and most belligerent residents. Consequently, Franny had very few interactions with them, and like with the people passing by her on the sidewalk, there was never any eye contact. She understood people's reluctance to engage - perhaps fearing her, or the sense of failure she represented to them. At one time she had a family and a life. But that was many years and buckets of tears ago.

As Sarah emerged from the pizza shop, she heard the squeal of brakes and a loud thud. Laying on the ground in front of her was the woman from the sidewalk. She did not appear to be badly injured, and Sarah ran over to help her up. The car took off. The people nearby looked away and kept walking. After helping Franny to the sidewalk, Sarah started to dial the police - but Franny gently took the phone from her hands and hung up. She did not want to create a fuss - and after thanking Sarah, headed to the shelter.

It all happened so fast Sarah thought. She was not even able to see what the woman looked like since it was so dark. Reassured that she was able to walk - Sarah dialed her mom for a ride home. When no one answered she tried her dad - but of course it went right to voicemail. Snow had started falling and it was getting cold, so she headed into the church across the street - preferring its quiet to the crowds in the stores. Sarah was not particularly religious, but knew the building was usually open. It was not the first time she had to wait until someone remembered and came to bring her home.

As Sarah entered the church, she saw that it was empty. She took a seat near the aisle to wait for someone to answer her calls home. After a few minutes Sarah heard muffled sobbing, and she noticed someone laying on the floor behind the pews. It was the woman who had been hit by the car. Fearfully she approached and called out to her in a soft voice. Perhaps she had been more badly injured than Sarah thought. "Why are you crying," she asked. "Are you hurt?"

Franny responded, "No, these are tears of joy. The shelter was full so I came in here to sleep." Sarah asked, "What are you joyful about - there's no food here, you were hit by a car and instead of a soft mattress your bed is a hard floor?"

Franny replied, "I have been praying every day because I was so lonely. People walk by and don't even bother to look at me. I have no one. Then, as I was walking across the street, God answered my prayers. Thankfully I was not hurt - but all the people who saw it happen just kept walking. Except you."

Sarah answered, "But I did nothing but help you up. I am ashamed of myself - I should have made sure you were safe and had a place to stay." Franny replied, "You gave me a wonderful Christmas present young lady - more valuable than the money people drop in my cup. You noticed me. For twenty years I have had a place to sleep and food to eat, but over time, the emptiness in my heart and soul has been growing. God is always there which gives me great comfort, but to not feel the touch of another person or never be truly seen is more painful than any car accident." With that, Sarah reached towards the women and the two embraced.

Mount Tabor School - by Erika Kjendal

In fall our Teen SOYO put together a family raffle basket to support the newly established Mount Tabor School of the Liberal Arts in Kansas City, Missouri. Thanks to all of your generous support, we raised eight hundred dollars! The school opened its doors for the first time this September and welcomed twenty-seven students from grades first through twelfth. The school was started by St. Mary of Egypt parish and provides a classical education grounded in the Orthodox faith. Purposely situated in a lower class area, the school also serves as a beacon of light and welcomes students from not only the parish but also the vulnerable children in the surrounding neighborhood. Mr. Adam Lockridge is the headmaster, and I was blessed to be in his online literature class last year. I miss his excellent teaching this year, but I know this school is in the very best of hands. To continue to help as the school grows, the Teen SOYO is trying to plan a mission trip there in the not too distant future to give our help however we can. There is a playground to be built and many other projects to be done! This school and other Orthodox schools like it are such integral outposts of the church as they raise the next generation of laborers' in Christ's Kingdom. The foundation of these young men and women is being laid down in these school years, and it is a great blessing to support a school that teaches them the wisdom and virtue they need to accomplish the work God is calling them to do.

Recipe Box – by Pauline Rassias

Katya Rosenzweig volunteered to make Sharlotka for our recent bake sale, so we added it to our preorder form. The response was more than expected and seven Sharlotka cakes were ordered. Some came forward to help Katya, and a few of us non-Russians undertook the task. I chose a recipe online and enjoyed making my first deliciously light and fluffy Russian Apple Cake.

Sharlotka - Russian Apple Cake

Ingredients:

- acceptable)
- 1 TBS lemon juice
- 3 lg. eggs at room temp.
- 1 C. sugar
- 1 tsp almond extract
- measuring and measure accurately)
- *Add to flour and sift together:*
- ½ tsp cinnamon
- ½ tsp nutmeg
- dash Kosher salt
- Confectioners sugar for dusting.

Preheat oven to 350F.

Grease bottom and sides of a 9" springform pan and line with parchment.

4 Granny Smith apples. (any apple is Peel, core and slice apples about 1/4" thick. Toss with lemon juice and 2 TBS sugar. Set aside

Beat eggs on high speed with electric mixer (hand or standing) until fluffy.

Add almond flavor and slowly add sugar while continuing to beat. Beat until ribbon forms when ³/₄ C plus 2 TBS flour. (fluff before you raise the beaters, about 8 minutes.

Gently fold in the flour 1/3 at a time. Be careful here to maintain air in the batter.

Now, layer the sliced apples on the bottom of the springform pan. Pour the batter over the apples and shake pan lightly so batter falls between apples. Let stand 5 minutes then bake until toothpick comes out clean (45-60 min). I know you will ENJOY!
